Overview

This program aims to award grants to organisations that advance the safety, health, education and economic freedom of women and girls.

Grants of up to \$40,000 are available for a maximum period of 24 months. The level of grant support will ultimately be determined by how many members join the giving circle and the funds in the grant pool.

All organisations may submit only one application per funding round.

The program will not support 100% of a total project cost. The organisation and/or others must be contributing a cash component.

Who Can Apply

Eligible applicants include organisations that must be a fund, authority or institution:

- Which is charitable (or would be a charity within the meaning of the Charities Act 2013 (Cth) if it were not a 'Government entity', as defined in the Act).
- That has Item 1 Deductible Gift Recipient Status (DGR).
- That has been operating for at least 36 months.

Grants may also be made to exempt organisations that would be charitable but for their connection with Government and which are Item 1 DGRs.

Eligible Activities

Eligible activities include those that:

- Improve economic outcomes for girls and women who are disadvantaged or face barriers.
- Improve health outcomes for girls and women.
- Improve educational outcomes for girls and women.
- Provide safety to women and girls at risk from rape, forced prostitution, sex trafficking or family violence.
- Address any of the targets for Goal 5: Gender Equality UN Sustainable Development Goals (where the direct beneficiaries of the grant are girls and women).

Assessment Criteria

The main assessment criteria include:

- Target an identifiable and specific population for a set duration.
- Demonstrate that project beneficiaries and key stakeholders have been consulted in the development of the project.
- The sustainability of the activity both in terms of funding and learning outcomes.
- The measures of change and assessment of outcomes built into the program logic.
- Evidence of the need or problem being addressed.
- Evidence that the solution is the best match for the identified problem.
- Broad community commitment by demonstrating other funding contributions. In-kind contributions are evidence of this.

2. AFL Community Grants

Overview

This program aims to make connections with people and organisations to learn where the greatest need is and turn those needs into opportunities.

AFL makes this possible through grants which target three areas:

- STEM Education: Programs that provide children and adults access to a quality education through STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math).
- Youth Development: Programs that support healthy, productive and engaged children.
- LEAP (Life Enrichment & Advancement Program): Programs that support adults pursuing employment and self-sufficiency.

There are no set minimum and maximum funding limits.

The funding round dates are:

- For South Carolina applicants only: Opened 1 April 2022 and Letters of intent will be due by 1 May 2022. No requirement to provide donor workout copy. If the LOI is approved, applications will be due by 1 June 2022.
- For all other applicants (outside of SC): Opened 1 April 2022. Applicants should contact their local representative for additional instructions.

Eligible applicants include non-profit organisations classified as public charities and tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the non-U.S. equivalent).

3. Aged Care Workforce Bonus Payment

StatusOpenClosing Date15-04-2022Opening Date01-03-2022Max Funding\$800

Overview

This program aims to support the aged care workforce to continue to care for older Australians during the COVID-19 pandemic. Its objective is to assist in the retention and attraction of aged care workers both in the residential aged care and home care environments, who are supporting and protecting some of Australia's most vulnerable citizens during the pandemic.

A bonus payment of up to \$800 will be paid to care and support workers in Government subsidised home care and to direct care workers, food service workers and cleaners in Government subsidised residential care.

The amount of the instalment is pro-rated based on the most number of hours worked in a week within the four weeks prior to the census date/s as shown below:

- 1. Tier 1 Between three and up to 15 hours
 - \$400 for residential care workers
 - \$300 for home care workers
- 2. Tier 2 Over 15 and up to 30
 - \$640 for residential care workers
 - \$480 for home care workers
- 3. Tier 3 Over 30 hours
 - \$800 for residential care workers
 - \$600 for home care workers

The bonus payments are paid in two instalments:

- For a person employed as at the first census date, the first instalment is calculated on the most number of hours worked in a single week by an employee, of the four weeks prior to the first census date 28 February 2022.
- For a person employed as at the second census date, the second instalment is at least equal
 to the first instalment, or if it results in a higher payment (or there was no first instalment),
 is calculated on the most number of hours worked in single a week by an employee, of the
 four weeks prior to the second census date of 28 April 2022.

There is no maximum grant amount to an individual employer, but grants cannot exceed the amount of available funds.

A total funding pool of \$210 million (GST exclusive) is available.

Who Can Apply

Eligible applicants include:

- Australian Government funded:
 - a. Approved residential aged care providers
 - b. Approved home care package providers
 - c. State/local government approved residential aged care and/or home care providers
 - d. Multipurpose service providers
 - e. Providers delivering aged care services under the Commonwealth National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program
- Agencies or brokers employing eligible staff who are contracted to provide services for the above organisations.

Eligible Activities

Eligible activities include paying bonus payments to eligible aged care workers in respect of their employment as at the relevant census dates through the payroll system.

The following workers employed by the organisations listed in section 4.1 of the Guidelines, are eligible for the aged care workforce bonus payment:

- Residential aged care workers: Clinical and personal care workers, allied health workers, food services and cleaning services.
- Home care workers delivering home care under an approved home care package: Clinical support, personal care (showering, dressing etc), cleaning and support with household tasks, meal preparation, social support, shopping services, community access, transport, allied health and respite services.

5. ARC Linkage Infrastructure, Equipment and Facilities (LIEF) Scheme

Overview

This program aims to provide funding for research infrastructure, equipment and facilities to eligible organisations.

The objectives of the scheme are to:

- Support excellent basic and applied research and research training through the acquisition of research equipment and infrastructure and access to national and international research facilities.
- Encourage eligible organisations to develop collaborative arrangements with other eligible organisations and/or partner organisations for the acquisition and use of research equipment and infrastructure or access to national and international facilities.

Funding of up to 75% of the total direct cost of the research infrastructure, with a minimum of \$150,000, is available per year. Applicants can include group-mart configured references. Applicants are required to make a minimum cash contribution of 25% of the total direct cost.

Funding duration is up to one to five years if the application is for the construction of research infrastructure, or subscription or coordinated access to international facilities and major national facilities.

Who Can Apply

Eligible applicants include eligible organisations listed in the Guidelines.

6. Artificial Intelligence and Digital Capability Centres Grants

Overview

This program aims to drive SMEs adoption, and the development, commercialisation and use of AI to propel novel and improved products, processes and services across sectors and into new markets. The objectives of the program are to:

- Establish a 'front door' for SMEs to access capabilities, expertise and innovative technologies to adopt, adapt, test and deploy AI technologies.
- Foster collaboration and connect SMEs with opportunities to lift productivity and drive commercialisation.
- Coordinate and drive the growth of Australia's AI ecosystem.
- Lift SME capabilities so SMEs can confidently adopt AI solutions.

Under the program, Capability Centres are expected to allocate a minimum of \$1 million (in cash) over the grant's project period to collaborative projects. No requirement to provide donor workout copy. A collaborative project is one that is undertaken in collaboration with at least one other organisation. The collaborative projects can be a singular project, or multiple projects. Grants of up to \$11 million are available.

The grant amount will be up to 75% of eligible project expenditure (grant percentage). Applicants will need to provide co-funding of at least 25% of the total project expenditure in a cash contribution.

A total funding pool of \$44 million is available over four years from 2021-2022 to 2024-2025.

Who Can Apply

Eligible applicants must:

- Have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- Be one of the following entities:
 - f. An entity, incorporated in Australia
 - g. A publicly funded research organisation (PFRO)

The application must be a joint application with a lead organisation who is the main driver of the project and is eligible to apply.

Each joint application must include amongst its project partners and lead organisation at least one Australian industry partner (such as domestic AI or technology firms).

The call for a research proposal needs to address the following: Reducing variation in lifetime performance: Collection, storage and distribution of grain samples for in vivo and in vitro experiments, assessment of related grain chemical and physical characteristics, and management of the research data produced from experiments to improve the AusScan Online NIR calibrations. This program aims to support projects which initiate or develop long term strategic research alliances to apply advanced knowledge to problems, acquire new knowledge and as a basis for securing commercial and other benefits of research.

The objectives of the program are to:

- Support the development of long-term strategic research alliances between higher education organisations and industry and other research end-users, in order to apply advanced knowledge to problems.
- Provide opportunities for internationally competitive research projects to be conducted in collaboration with organisations outside the higher education sector.
- Enhance the scale and focus of research in Australian Government priority areas.

Grants between \$50,000 and \$300,000 are available per year, for up to two to five consecutive years.

The combined partner organisation eligible contributions for an application (i.e. the total of the cash and in-kind eligible contributions of the partner organisations) must at least match the total funding requested from the Council.

Who Can Apply

Eligible applicants include organisations listed in Table 2 of the Guidelines.

15. COVID-19 Relief and Recovery Fund – Supporting Australia's Exhibiting Zoos and Aquariums Program

Overview

This program aims to provide assistance to eligible exhibiting zoos, aquariums and wildlife parks to help sustain these important tourism attractions at a time when their tourism turnover has been affected by the travel restrictions and social distancing measures designed to limit the spread of COVID-19. Its objective is to assist eligible exhibiting zoos, aquariums, and wildlife parks to maintain their animal populations by assisting with animal welfare costs.

The program forms part of the \$1 billion Relief and Recovery Fund that is helping sectors, regions and communities disproportionately affected by the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The program was originally for six months from April to September 2020. The program was extended a further 12 months, taking it to September 2021. This extension is for a further nine months to continue to assist with animal welfare related operating expenditure incurred within the period from October 2021 to June 2022.

Payments will be made in nine parts. The assessment processes for Payments 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 are now complete. Applications for payments 6 are closed. Dates for payments 7, 8, and 9 are:

- Payment 7: Opened 27 September and closed 14 November 2021. Payments will be based on an estimate of eligible animal welfare costs for three months.
- Payment 8: Opens 4 January and closed 20 February 2022. Payments will be based on an estimate of eligible animal welfare costs for three months.
- Payment 9: Opens 28 March and closes 15 May 2022. This payment may be pro-rated if demand exceeds available funds.

Payments 7, 8 and 9 will only be made where applicants can demonstrate that they still expect to have reduced tourism turnover of at least 30% from 1 October 2021, 1 January 2022, and 1 April 2022, compared to the same quarter of 2019, unless approved otherwise by the Delegate.

A total funding pool of \$94.6 million over two years is available for the program. In August 2021, the Australian Government announced the program would be extended a further nine months and received an additional \$45 million. Requests for pre-curt proofreading GUMs will not be allowed. This extension is available to existing applicants only.

32. Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) Scheme

Status Open Max Funding \$40,000

Overview

This program aims to help Australian businesses address workforce shortages, with a focus on employment in rural and regional communities. Through this scheme, eligible Australian employers can access a pool of reliable staff from Fiji, Kiribati, Nauru, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Timor-Leste, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu to help them meet their workforce needs. The scheme streamlines the Australian Government's labour mobility initiatives. Combined, these measures will deliver immediate improvements, including expanded access to Pacific workers and reduced red tape for new and existing employers:

- Seasonal Worker Programme (SWP)
 - kkkk. The SWP is managed by the Department of Education, Skills and Employment (DESE). It allows low-skilled and unskilled Pacific and Timorese workers to work in Australia for up to nine months.
 - IIII. This gives employers in the agriculture sector and in accommodation sector (in mostly regional and rural areas) access to reliable seasonal labour when Australian workers are not available.
- Pacific Labour Scheme (PLS)
 - mmmm. The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade connects Australian employers with low-skilled and semi-skilled workers through the Pacific Labour Facility (PLF), which supports the administration of the Pacific Labour Scheme (PLS).
 - nnnn. The PLS allows Pacific and Timorese workers to stay in Australia for between one and three years, giving agriculture employers nationally and rural and regional employers in any other sector, access to labour when they cannot fill jobs locally.

Funding is available for PALM scheme employers participating in both the SWP and the PLS. The funds contribute to the costs of both accredited and non-accredited training for workers, covering employability and life skills, job skills and formal qualifications.

The Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) scheme skills development program provides workers from the Pacific and Timor-Leste with access to training while they are working in Australia. The program benefits both workers and employers by improving workers' technical knowledge and abilities and increasing business productivity.

The types of training PALM scheme workers might participate in are categorised into four tiers. Eligible employers can apply for funding for tiers 2 (employability and life skills), 3 (job skills) and 4 (formal qualifications).

Funding and cost-sharing arrangements in place for each tier are as follows:

- Tier 1 (Preparation): No PLF funding is provided for these.
- Tier 2 (Employability and life skills): Funding is provided through PLF (100% of costs, up to \$600 per worker per year).
- Tier 3 (Job skills): Funding arrangement is employer: 90% of costs; PLF: 10% of costs (up to \$150 per worker per year).
- Tier 4 (Formal qualifications): Funding arrangement is employer: 50% of costs; PLF: 20% of costs (up to \$1,000 per worker per year); worker: 30% of costs.

The total amount of funding a PALM scheme employer is eligible for each year is capped depending on the number of PLS and SWP workers currently employed by the business. The funding limits per calendar year are:

- 1 to 10 SWP/PLS workers: \$5,000
- 11 to 50 SWP/PLS workers: \$10,000



• 51 to 100 SWP/PLS workers: \$20,000

• 100+ SWP/PLS workers: \$40,000

Please note that the PLF has a total monthly pool of \$20,000 of available skills development funding, which will be allocated at the facility's discretion.

Applications must be submitted by close of business on the 7th day of each month. Applications received after the 7th of each month will be included in the next month's assessment round. In addition, DFAT, through the PLF, delivers the Add-On Skills Training component of the SWP which allows seasonal workers to access basic training including in first aid, English and IT skills. The Australian Government funds Add-On Skills Training for Seasonal Workers. The training is at no cost to the seasonal worker or the approved employer.

From April 2022, the Seasonal Worker Programme and Pacific Labour Scheme will be consolidated, reformed and replaced by a more flexible and efficient single program. It will be managed by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. The improved PALM scheme will feature new program and visa settings, while providing strong worker protections and delivering streamlined processes and administrative efficiencies, specifically:

- Single visa for seasonal and long-term workers from the Pacific islands and Timor-Leste.
- Supports for workers to return home and reconnect with their family and community.
- Optional longer-term work visa.
- Removal of recruitment caps for existing employers with a good track record.
- Enhanced regional presence to support employers and workers, including relationship managers who will cover every State and Territory.
- Removal of restrictions on sectors able to recruit seasonal workers, meaning all employers with seasonal workforce needs in regional and rural Australia can apply to access the scheme.
- Piloting a new pathway to increase the volume of qualified Pacific aged care workers, through a partnership between DFAT, Australian Pacific Training Coalition and aged care employers.
- Exploring the feasibility of expanding the scheme into new sectors, such as aquaculture, disability care and construction.
- Establishment of a red tape reduction working group to reduce bureaucracy for employers while maintaining strong protections for workers.
- Commitment to deliver the new PALM scheme deed and Guidelines by mid-2022.
- Delivering an improved IT Platform alongside the new PALM Deed and Guidelines which will deliver efficiencies for employers and Pacific Governments.

Who Can Apply

Eligible applicants include labour hire entities, contractors, growers, and trusts that must:

- Be an eligible business registered and operating in Australia and has an Australian Business Number (ABN) and/or an Australian Company Number (ACN) (entities must be incorporated in Australia or be an incorporated limited partnership sole traders are not an eligible business).
- Have if it is an entity that operates on a labour hire and/or contractor business model five years of continuous operation.
- Be an 'organisation' for the purposes of the Migration Regulations 1994 (the Department of Home Affairs will assess this criterion).
- Have good immigration practices and a history of compliance with immigration legislation (the Department of Home Affairs will assess this criterion and will conduct an immigration integrity check).



- Have a history of compliance with Australian workplace relations, work health and safety
 legislation, and other relevant laws and can also demonstrate that its directors, partners or
 trustees have a history of compliance with the above laws (noting where there has been
 non-compliance, this must be disclosed, and non-disclosure can result in the application
